
## **ENDRE CSOMAN**

April 17, 1938 ~ August 17, 2022

They first escaped to Austria, then to Germany, before arriving at Camp Kilmer in New Brunswick, N.J., a former Army camp that became a resettlement camp for some 30,000 refugees following the Hungarian Revolution

Endre and Arlene were active members of the Third

Avenue Calvin Reformed Church in Beaver Falls, where he served as Chief Elder for a number of years. He was recognized in 2008 as an Exemplary Church Worker by the Calvin Synod Conference of the United Church of Christ. His

Endre was actively involved in the Hungarian-American community, and he served as an unofficial historian, once being interviewed on Hungarian television. On March 13, 2012 Endre was honored by the Government of Hungary for a lifetime dedication to the Hungarian Community in the United States with a special ceremony at Parliament

Hungary. Endre was proud of his vocational training and work in the steel mills in Beaver County. After many years of such work, he was elected as Vice President of the Hungarian Reformed he was elected as vice President of the Hungarian Reformed Federation of America in Washington, D.C., where he worked for eight years. Following that, he served as Vice President Fraternal at the William Penn Association in Pittsburgh. At both the HRFA and the WPA, Endre started the tradition of Hungarian picnics, first in Ligonier and then at Penn Scenic View in Youngwood. He is survived by five children and their spouses, Julia Csoman, Patterson Township, Endre "Butch" and Nadine Csoman, New Galilee, Kati Csoman and Emil Nagengast, Huntingdon, PA, Joe and Connie Csoman, North Sewickley Township, Louis and Renee Csoman, Chippewa Township; five grandchildren, Alan Csoman, Shaunte Csoman, Otto Nagengast, Hanna Csoman, Levi Csoman; and three greatgrandchildren, Cheyenne Csoman, Ashton Curry, and Gage Curry and three step-grandchildren Nadine Foik, Chad Shaffer and Tyler Shaffer. Endre Arlene is also survived by many relatives in Hungary, most notably his beloved cousin Margit whom he called on a regular basis.
