After graduating from Ann Arbor High School in 1967, she accepted a scholarship to attend the University of Michigan from which she obtained a Bachelor's degree. In keeping with her kindhearted and selfless disposition, she further obtained a Master's degree in Social Work from the University of Minnesota with the aim of helping all that she could. Her career in Social Work spanned over four decades in Illinois, Minnesota, Ohio, Michigan, and Pennsylvania. Her generosity and selflessness were evident throughout her career as she counseled people from all walks of life, giving them comfort and offering aid during some of their darkest times. Diane was known throughout her life for her positive and thoughtful outlook and also for her adventurous spirit. She loved to travel and to experience new things. She was a huge supporter of the arts, a voracious reader, a lifelong learner, and later in her life, a published children's book author. Giving back to the community was of profound importance to her and she gave to a great many social causes.
