Jackie was born on April 16, 1928, to parents Henry and Margaret Powell, each whom was a physician in Springs. Colorado Jackie's parents were an inspiration and she fondly riding remembered horses with family members in the Garden of the Gods, a

spectacular and massive rock formation right near her home

in Colorado Springs.

Jackie graduated from Wellesley College in 1949 and continued her study of history as she earned her Master's degree at the University of Wisconsin. Teaching history brought Jackie into the world of education and was always her first academic focus. Jackie was a scholar regarding the U.S. Constitution, and she loved that working with young people kept her sense for the Constitution "fresh and always

open to interpretation.

Jackie's mother was a trailblazer as a female physician and Jackie followed her mother's example by working in schools as a teacher and administrator dedicated to educational excellence for young women. Jackie was a faculty member at the Ethel Walker School, the Northfield School for Girls Mercersburg Academy. Mercersburg became coeducational school in 1970 and the school wanted Jackie to help them become a great school for both boys and girls and to develop a counseling program. Jackie's leadership helped the school combine its academic excellence with equitable and caring foundations. Jackie was wonderfully successful as an educator and leader at each of her three

schools. Outside of her work, Jackie led a full and vibrant life. She had an adventurous spirit and greatly enjoyed her travels abroad, time spent each summer by the beach in Maine, and holiday visits with her family in Massachusetts and Ohio. She brought a love of music to her daily life and took full advantage of the many musical offerings of her adopted city of Pittsburgh. She especially loved performances by the Pittsburgh Symphony and the River City Brass Band. Jackie was active throughout her life in golf, tennis, political causes, and her church communities. She was fascinating and well-rounded in her interests, enjoying a ballgame at Pirates Stadium as much as an intellectual debate with friends and colleagues. She was exceptionally generous with her time and attention, always eager to volunteer in her community or help a friend in need. Those who had the pleasure of knowing Jackie knew she was remarkably grounded, humble and kind. She was quick to laugh, and her sense of humor was as sharp as a tack! Jackie is survived by many beloved family members and dear friends who will remember and love her always. May her legacy serve to remind us all to live lives of purpose, curiosity, gratitude, generosity and love. A memorial service for Jackie will be held at Longwood at

Oakmont, at a date to be determined.
