In his retirement, Alberto took great pride in passing on his knowledge of technology and culture by teaching classes for seniors at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Carnegie Mellon. Alberto also enjoyed traveling with his family and grandchildren to Argentina, Cancun, and Costa Rica. He will be fondly remembered by his grandchildren as "Papa", a grand storyteller of his humorous, enthralling, and witty life expériences. He was always a gentleman.
