Marcie and Ron briefly moved to Ohio to start a Sir Pizza restaurant. Both of their children were born in Ohio. They moved back to PA and settled in the North Hills where their legacy together began. Each resumed their teaching careers, Marcie at Cumberland Hills School in McCandless, PA and Ron with the City of Pittsburgh.

She cherished her time as an educator at Cumberland Hills School District) and often included her family in events at the school. Upon the closing of Cumberland in 1987, Marcie was asked by her friend, Carol Mitchell, to come and teach at her new school, the Verland Foundation, a school for students with severe intellectual and physical disabilities. She never truly left Verland because she brought its mission of serving the area's most vulnerable to her beloved church, St. John Neumann Catholic Church. Through the SJN Verland Ministries Outreach program, Marcie sent dedicated volunteers, including SJN's Pastor, Fr. William Bovard, to the residents. This ministry continued for decades with the help of her many friends, most notably Andy James and the late Peggy Garboosian.

She retired as a 7th grade English teacher at Dorseyville. In a full circle moment, Marcie is remembered fondly by her grandchildren's North Allegheny 4th grade teacher, Patrick Frank, as one of his most inspiring teachers in Fox Chapel, giving him Lee lacocca's Autobiography. She had a habit of giving all her students, and others, books that she thought would personally benefit them.

Of course, we cannot overlook her contributions to the North Hills business community. Marcie was a founding member of Sir Pizza, a family-owned restaurant operating in the North Hills of Pittsburgh since 1975. Her brother Pete Jubeck started the chain in Muncie, Indiana and gave his sister Marcie, her husband Ron, brother and sisterin-law Rich and Sandy the rights to Pennsylvania and it is still family-run today. Although she did not take part in the day-to-day retail operation because she was teaching and raising a family, Marcie was often heard reminding people that "If it wasn't for her, Sir Pizza would not have come to Pittsburgh." hat "n ic Pittsburgh." Marcie was generous with her time and gifts, both financial and talent. She was passionate about helping those who she thought were underserved people in her community and that passion extended to her fierce advocacy for women and education. She belonged to the North Hills Pittsburgh Branch of American Association of University Women (AAUW). She proudly served in many leadership roles including President and Policy Director. She also received the Branch Outstanding Woman Award. She wrote a letter to the Branch revealing that joining the group was a "wonderful experience that created within me a newfound wisdom, many wonderful new friends, and most of all a renewal of strength and energy to continue growing. I will be forever grateful for my relationship with AAUW."

Marcie's religious spirit was dedicated to St. John Neumann Church (Regina Coeli Parish) since its start in 1979. As per her usual "can do" philosophy, Marcie and her fatherin-law, Mike Filiaggi were a part of the original building committee that literally knocked on doors in the community to raise funds for the church building that was ultimately erected in 1982. She was a lector, Eucharistic Minister, choir member, Vacation Bible School leader and CCD teacher.

As many will attest, Marcie Filiaggi not only had endless energy for her "crusades" of care and compassion, but she had a knack of convincing her vast network of family and friends to join her in these endeavors. She used to say that "although life isn't fair, we should all do our part to even the playing field." Few people refused her requests, and many felt immensely rewarded by her friendship.

She led a life beyond her wildest dreams, "from outhouse to Buckingham Palace," her daughter used to say and "she never shied away from sharing her path in life."
