Joe was a long-time, dedicated employee at Shenango Inc. where he worked in various jobs at the foundry for 35 years until the facility closed in 1990. Rather than retire, he joined Quest Diagnostics as a courier where he worked for 15

years. Given his outgoing nature, Quest was his perfect job. When he wasn't working, Joe could be found tending to his garden, where every plant had to be perfectly aligned, or in his wine cellar under the back porch where he annually tinkered with his recipe for homemade wine. He was always in search of the perfect blend and technique and regardless

in search of the perfect blend and tecnnique and regaruless of the outcome he was going to drink every drop! Outside of his love for his family, his next love was for his hometown of Coraopolis. Joe was elected to the Borough Council in 1969 and represented the Fourth Ward for 12 years, including 7 years as President of Council. During his years on Council, he was a tireless advocate for his Fourth Ward neighbors and the broader Coraopolis community. He was instrumental in securing funding to rebuild the Sewickley Bridge, to reconstruct Fifth Avenue, and to develop the Coraopolis Towers along with numerous other Sewickley Bridge, to reconstruct Fifth Avenue, and to develop the Coraopolis Towers along with numerous other projects. Joe was elected Mayor and served one term before "retiring" from public service. That retirement did not last. He founded and served as President of the Coraopolis Historical Society and he took great pleasure in spearheading the publication of two historical books about Coraopolis, including "The Centennial History of the Borough of Coraopolis" and in creating the Historical Society room in the Coraopolis Library.

Joe was preceded in death by his brother Donald (Janet) and his brother-in-law Michael Nichay.

He was the proud uncle of Valerie (Bill) Carnohan; and the late Mark (Jennifer) DiVito. He is also very proud of his great-nieces and nephews Bryce, Myles and Maryn Carnohan, Kaitlyn (Eddie) Bretch, Kayden and Karly DiVito, and Alicia (RJ) Stanley.
