In 1999, Bob joined the faculty of the (then) Department of Information Science and Telecommunications as an adjunct faculty member. During his tenure with the Department, Bob taught an impressive number of classes. In 2019, he worked closely with then department chair Prashant Krishnamurthy in redesigning the BS in Informational Science curriculum, expanding it to a four-year program. He also contributed to the development of the BS in Computational Social Science and the newly introduced Information Science Minor. Bob's in-depth knowledge of higher education served the department and Pitt well.
