Herman Louis Skerlong, known to the world, as "Rocky," "The Mayor," and "The Hermanator," passed away peacefully on and "The Hermanator," passed away peacefully on December 16, 2023. He is finally reunited with the love of his life, Violet Moore Skerlong. They were married for 54 years before her passing in 1995. Though no children of their own, they had many nieces, nephews, grandnieces and nephews, spanning several generations of his 103 years. Herman was born July 26, 1920, in Lawrenceville to Anthony and Agnes Skerlong. He was a member of Saint Valentine's Catholic Church in Bethel Park where he attended Saturday evening Mass followed by coffee and camaraderie with triends at followed by coffee and camaraderie with friends at McDonalds.

Herman was drafted in 1942 and served under the great General George Patton in the 80th Division as a machine gunner. He earned the Bronze Star in the Battle of The Bulge putting himself in front of enemy fire to pull an injured brother-in-arms to safety. After being treated for significant frostbite on both feet, which were almost amputated, Herman returned to the United States and led a very fulfilling career. He worked for the U.S. Post Office driving an armored truck and then relocated to California where he was a civilian employee of the U.S. Navy. Upon retirement, Herm and Vi came home to Pittsburgh and enjoyed many years with family and friends, residing in Bethel Park. You would get engrossed in Herm's stories for hours, taking you back in time to WWII, and his details were as sharp as a tack until the day he passed. He proudly marched in all of the Pittsburgh and Brentwood Veterans Day parades, still fitting into his WWII uniform, and looking as handsome as he did the day he first put in on in 1942. Over the years, he became known somewhat as a "community celebrity" throughout Bethel Park, being interviewed by various local news channels who wanted to hear about his WWII endeavors.
