After Sunday Mass, Moe would enjoy family activities such as white watering canoeing and family gatherings. As faith was a big part of his life, even in his last year, Moe was an active participant in his senior living community's Sunday Rosary Group.
In 1991 Moe and Anna Walsh transitioned into retirement
