Daughter of Martin J. and Katherine E. (Volk) Silvernail, Jean was born in Aberdeen South Dakota, the eldest of eight children. She is preceded death by her parents; brothers, Robert and James; beloved sister-in-law, Julie Silvernail; niece, Deborań Silvernail Devereaux nephew, Michael Graikowski. convent at the age of 14, Jean became a Benedictine nun at
Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton, S.D. She taught a variety
of primary, secondary, and high school courses in Nebraska
and South Dakota, winding up as the Mother Superior of a
parish in Pueblo Colorado. She left the convent in 1968 to
broaden her impact. Through hard work, applying for every
grant, scholarship, and financial assistance possible, and
surviving on peanut butter, she completed her master's in
counseling at Arizona State University. She worked briefly
with Headstart in Tacoma, Washington, and then, in 1971,
moved to Pennsylvania and completed her doctorate in

Education at the University of Pittsburgh.

The second phase of her career was in adult education. She was responsible for faculty development at Robert Morris University, Pittsburgh, where she also taught courses in adult learning. She was a consultant to the Pennsylvania Medical Society and the Pennsylvania Department of Education. In 1990 she became Director of the Institute of Education at South Hills Health Center (Jefferson Regional Medical Center) in Pittsburgh. She quietly established long-term meaningful connections across the four generations of her far-flung family. She became the family's binding force after her mother's death in 1996. She was joyfully engaged with friends and family, consistently noting their achievements and celebrating their milestones. She was the person to turn to when you needed encouragement, particularly to aspire to higher education or to take a risk that would improve you. Jean's third phase was a wonderful retirement. This allowed her to do what she loved...travel. Visiting family living in all parts of the country created one destination after another, including her favorite, Manzanita, Oregon. The world was another destination, with trips with a variety of friends and family to Italy, France, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Russia, Iceland, Mexico, Costa Rica, and several countries in Africa. She sailed around the world as an administrator with the Semester at Sea program, experiencing another dozen countries. Love of life, dear friends, music, opera, drama, family, making jewelry, reading, family... how does one describe a full life, one driven by a passion for learning? Her circle of friends was wide, but dear to her were Diane Davis, Rita Wilson, Juliana Shayne, and Jeannie and Julie (both deceased), sisters-in-law Sheila, and Patty.

Jean's motto was "Joie I Vivre!", which is certainly how she lived her life. She requested that we not mourn her passing, but celebrate her life. To honor that request and her love of travel, life celebrations will be held in Pittsburgh, Minneapolis, Manzanita, and Aberdeen, where her ashes will be interred.
