Born on October 29, 1929, Norma ushered in the Great Depression. She was the second child and first daughter of Tony and Della Marenno of the West End. Raised on McKnight Street, they shared a home with Aunt Katie and Uncle Louie Tamillia and her cousins.

Norma was extremely bright and hard-working. The Nuns at St. James School wanted her to attend college. Instead, she enlisted in the U.S. Army and was one of the first females chosen for the Women's Army Corps (The WACS). She was selected to serve in the Counterintelligence Corps and served as a colonel's Administrative Assistant. Norma served during the Korean War and was stationed in Japan.

Norma returned to Pittsburgh with the help of her parents, her Uncle Rudy Mucci, and brother-in-law, Joe Calliguire. She began working at Pittsburgh National Bank and met Larry Pyszola, her husband and one true love.

Norma and Larry moved to New York where Norma began her career with the European Health Spas, where she hit her stride by becoming an Area Director. When they moved back to Pittsburgh, she became the #1 Area Director in the nation, and she was extremely proud of this accomplishment. She briefly retired and then began working with her daughter, Debra Patti, to found Settlements, Ltd.

Norma especially loved her grandchildren and great-grandchildren, traveling and flowers. Her fondest memories include trips to Italy (where Pope John Paul II touched her hand), Bermuda, Hawaii, Las Vegas, Thailand, London, Paris, Florida but especially to Detroit to see the Steelers win Super Bowl XL. She loved her Steelers.

A favorite pastime was making hamburgers for the famous Caliguire tailgate parties after Pitt home games in the late 1980's.

Norma would like to be remembered for the love she had for the extended Marenno clan which includes the Marino, Brandy and Caliguire families, her strong work ethic and her achievements. Norma had a special devotion to Jesus through the Blessed Mother, St. Padre Pio, and St. Anthony of Padua.

She was a force in life and one of the strongest women we know. She will be deeply and sorely missed.
