Peter was born in Butler, Pennsylvania to Peter and Stella Sheptak on August 27, 1937. Graduating with high honors from Butler High School in 1955, he was a football and track standout winning the WPIAL Javelin title in 1955. He completed his undergraduate studies with high honors at the

He completed his undergraduate studies with high honors at the University of Notre Dame in 1959. While there, he participated in freshman football and continued to throw the Javelin with the Notre Dame track team. He went on to receive his Doctor of Medicine from the University of Pittsburgh in 1963 and completed his Neurosurgical residency training at Pitt in 1968. He was awarded an NIH postdoctoral research fellowship in 1965 where he researched electrophysiology of the brain. Following the completion of his training, he devoted his professional career to neurological surgery as both a teacher and practicing surgeon. He, along with several neurosurgeons, developed a successful clinical practice (Oakland Neurosurgical Associates) and was on the staff of many local hospitals, most notably Presbyterian, Montefiore, and Shadyside hospitals. As a faculty member of the Department of Neurological Surgery at Pitt, he began his teaching duties with medical students and residents. As his responsibilities increased over time, he was appointed Clinical Professor and Vice Chairman of Neurological Surgery. His teaching legacy includes contributing to the training of close to 100 residents now practicing in the United States and overseas.

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Over the years, he served the medical community with great distinction, performing innovative, investigative, and clinical work relating to spinal degenerative disorders, pain management, cerebral vascular disease, and brain tumors. He had a major interest in skull-based tumors, especially acoustic tumors. He was a pioneer in developing the use of tissue adhesives to treat brain arterio-venous malformations and aneurysms. Other achievements include the publication of numerous articles in professional journals and textbooks. In 1988 Butler High School honored him with their Distinguished Graduate Award. To further honor the career and achievements of one of the department's most influential physicians and teachers, in 2006, the University of Pittsburgh established the Peter E. Sheptak Endowed Chair in Neurological Surgery. He was known as a consummate, energetic, and gentlemanly surgeon.

Dr. Sheptak also served as team Neurosurgeon for Pitt Football for 12 years and the Pittsburgh Penguins for 35 years - where he was rewarded with five Stanley Cup rings. He retired from active clinical practice in 2008 and cherished his time with family and friends in Hilton Head Island, S.C., and Pittsburgh.

In 1960, Peter met his loving and devoted wife Gracia while both were students at the University of Pittsburgh. They were married in June of 1962 and blessed with two children Peter and Alexa and seven loving grandchildren who call him their "Papou". Being a kind and dedicated father was of the utmost importance and he cherished the time he spent with his family. Peter and Gracia's love of traveling took them on adventures to Europe, Japan, India, and Africa. He treasured their family vacations in Hiltion Head, tarpon fishing in Islamorada, and ski and golf trips. His grandkids saw him as a true role model and their "hero". Nigh
