
RONALD "RON" ROBERT HARPER

He also dabbled in several soap operas, such as: Another World, Loving, Capitol, Generations, Where the Heart Is, and Love of Life. Ron enjoyed working as an actor all the days of his life.

He was preceded in death by his parents, George and Mabel Harper, along with both his siblings, George Harper

and Marion (Harper) Nist.

Ron is survived by his only child, Nicole, her husband, Daniel, and their two daughters, Veronica Violet, whom they lovingly call "little Roni" and Harper Hazel. In addition, he leaves behind his ex-wife, Shirley (Harper) Ruse; sister-in-law Mary (Harper) Early; two nephews, and four nieces, plus their children and grandchildren, respectively.
