
RONALD W. MARTIN

It was 800 miles from the North Pole. The camp consisted of 21 tunnels under the ice for a total length of 9,800 feet. It was powered by one of the first portable nuclear reactors in the world. The tunnels were 40 feet beneath the surface of the Greenland ice sheet where Ronald along with the other service men lived. Another little-known fact of his time in the service was that Ronald was an expert marksman. was an expert marksman.
