She loved to decorate and was known for her great taste in interiors. A thoughtful gift-giver, she applied her special touch to beautifully presented packages that never failed to make the recipient feel extra special.

Phyllis loved a good "get together", whether it be lunch with friends, a "joyride", or a shopping trip. No matter where Phyllis went, she arrived in style. She didn't believe in driving just any old car, instead preferring to "be-bop" around town in one of her many fun convertibles.

Phyllis was kind, intelligent, hardworking, fun, and unapologetically herself. A true original, she always kept you on your toes with her sense of humor and witty personality. She was famous for her legendary, endless sayings and colloquialisms that could make the most boring conversation entertaining. Some lines were from the military, some were passed down through her family, and almost all were colorful.
