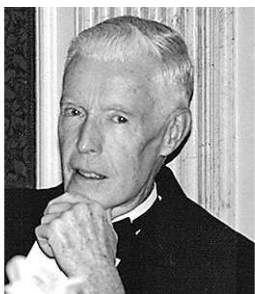


FRANCIS KING O'TOOLE

He also felt incredibly blessed to have the opportunity to know and love six great-grandchildren: Abram, Kayden, Rosalie, Kyle, Lorenzo and Dalio.

A prayerful and faithful man, he dedicated his life and work to Catholic institutions and never answered no when he was called to serve. King's faith was so strong that even while grieving his greatest loss for the past five years, he thanked the Lord every single day for bringing Barbara Ann into his life. He truly recognized everything as a gift from God and he changed the lives of many as he helped them find their way back to the Lord through his strong beliefs and his examples of thankful prayer.

King proudly served in the U.S. Marine Corps during the Korean War in ammunition distribution. He often shared stories about his time there and recalled how challenging the journey by water was to arrive in Korea. If you knew him, then you certainly had the opportunity to be reminded by him that "I was a Marine, you know". No one doubted this as he certainly had lived out their Core Values of honor, courage, and commitment in all aspects of his life.

Throughout his life, King enjoyed golfing with his friends and family and always fondly recalled annual golf trips to Sharon, PA with his father, father in law and uncle. For many years, Wednesday was golf day with great friends followed by fish sandwiches at Dorido's. A love of jazz took King and Barbara to shows all over the city. Their positive outlook on life apparently led them to never seeing a bad performance as when asked how any show was, the response was always "Best show we ever saw!" King also enjoyed gardening and woodworking. Many of his grandchildren and great grandchildren have slept in a beautiful cradle or rode a rocking horse crafted by his hands. However, one of his favorite things to make was a wooden crucifix. King proudly created several and presented them as gifts to family members and many friends.

If you were lucky enough to know King you never heard a complaint from him. Even when you knew he was not feeling well or he was in pain, when asked how he felt, his response was always "I feel great, thank God and St. Barbara!" This positivity endeared people to him and he never made an enemy.

During our time of loss we want to thank the friends and family who remembered our daddy with calls, visits, and countless cards and notes.
