His baseball abilities got him an invitation to try out as a pitcher for the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1952.

During his later years, he enjoyed playing tennis with Mollie winning the Pittsburgh City Park doubles championships multiple times. Once his knees would no longer allow for him to play tennis, he began his golf career. Frank loved chipping and taking his friends to new restaurants after a fun round.

Once in his retirement years, Frank was interested in storytelling, so he enrolled for a creative writing course at the Heinz History Center.

His love of his hometown of Verona and his Italian heritage afforded him the opportunity to write many stories for
