A graduate of Washburn High School in Minneapolis, MN, he went on to earn his Bachelor of Science degree at the University of Minnesota in Chemical Engineering and completed post-graduate work at the University of Delaware. His professional

career consisted of numerous positions within the chemicals division of the U.S. Steel Corporation, ultimately retiring as Vice Chairman of Aristech Chemical Corporation in 1995. He served on the boards of directors of Albemarle Corporation, RTI International Metals, and Duquesne University. Craig served as a radar operator in the United States Naval Reserves as a member of squadrons VP-816 and VP-932. He took great pride in being an American. He had a true love of the outdoors and was an avid duck hunter and fly fisherman. From his hunting cabin in Ottawa, OH to the far reaches of the globe, Craig's travel adventures gave him many amazing memories that he treasured until the end.
