She was a skilled driver with a lead foot who enjoyed music, had a great sense of humor, and told hilarious stories at family holiday gatherings. While she didn't like housework or cooking, Mae made a mean batch of fudge and the world's best hot fudge sauce to put over ice cream. She never missed one of her children's school sports and arts events, even when they went away to college. She adored her grandchildren and great grandchildren, who returned the affection.
