
CHARLES "CHUCK" C. EDWARDS

He meaningfully connected with others through his work and sport, but his life cannot be reduced to work and sport alone. They simply served as vehicles through which he expressed care and guidance. Toward the end of his life, Chuck suffered much in the way of bodily pain, due to his chronic health conditions, yet he endured his pain and suffering with dignity and courage. He died peacefully by letting go, releasing his spirit to the Divine Source from which he came. Chuck's passing to the Other Side, his return Home, was accompanied by the song, Elysium ("Now We are Free") by Lisa Gerrard and Klaus Badelt. Play this song and think of him.
