He eventually trained through CCAC to be an EMT and then a paramedic. Joe was one of the early founders of Rescue 2 and what is now Eastern Area EMS. After a time of volunteering at Rescue 2 in Turtle Creek, he was hired and served as a Pittsburgh Paramedic for 22 years.

As a child and working for the railroads, Joe had developed a great love of trains and model trains. Because of that love, Joe opened J&J Railroad Crossing, a model train store located in the shopping center in Turtle Creek. The store was a family affair with both his son, Josh and his daughter, Elizabeth serving as the only other employees.
