people, whether they understood it or not!

Returning to Pittsburgh, he worked a few more years, retiring in 2000. In retirement, he was an active member at Oakmont Country Club, playing golf and hosting friends and family. Several times, Bruce came close to discovering the secret of golf! Bruce and Kathy continued to travel and host international visitors. Winters were spent in Naples, FL, where Bruce liked playing bridge and golf and connecting with new friends. He was proud of his achievement as a Bridge Life Master, a level reached after thousands of hands. In his later years, he also made a study of opera and took a great liking to jazz.

Bruce was a bon vivant and wine aficionado, who loved fast cars and lived a life of commitment to family, friends and closely-held values. He was known as a person of strong beliefs, highly focused and interested in learning. He will be remembered fondly for his optimism, generosity, analytical
